Results of January 27, 2010 Homeless Survey

Homeless Totals

Totals for the homeless count conducted on January 27, 2010 include one-night emergency shelter and transitional housing program counts (One Night Shelter Count); count reports from eight school district sites in Marion and Polk counties (School Counts); site count surveys at the Department of Human Services, the YWCA, Salem Hospital, Marion County and City of Salem Courts, Salvation Army, Northwest Human Services, Union Gospel Mission Family Closet, St. Joseph's Shelter, Polk County Corrections, and Shangri-La (Short Surveys); Marion and Polk jail surveys (Marion County Jail Survey and Polk County Jail Survey); homeless observed count; and street surveys (Homeless Street Surveys).

The total number of homeless individuals counted in Marion and Polk counties on January 27, 2010 was 3,366. The total number counted on January 28, 2009 was 3,244, an increase of 122 individuals.

Street Count Interviews January 27th, 2010

On January 27, 2010, over 80 community volunteers conducted 242 interviews with people who had no permanent place to live in Marion and Polk counties. The interviews were conducted on the street, in parks, under bridges, in camps and at area homeless service organizations. All participants were informed that their names would not be collected and that their participation was completely voluntary.

DEMOGRAPHICS:

Street interviews resulted in data collected from 188 males and 51 females. 38% of homeless respondents were between the ages of 36-50 and 30% were over 50. 17% of the participants were veterans. 55% of all participants reported graduating from high school and/or having some college education.

HOMELESS CHARACTERISTICS:

89 participants (37%) indicated they have been homeless for less than 1 year, and 149 participants (61%) have been homeless for more than 1 year. 146 (60%) of the participants have stayed in a shelter at some point during their homelessness. 74% of participants indicated they eat regularly, although 194 (80%) say they eat 2 times or less per day. In 2009, 27% of participants stated they ate 3 meals a day, in 2010 only 19% indicated they ate 3 meals a day. 60% of respondents indicated they were "out here alone". Of those not alone, 40% were with family. Of those with family, when asked, "If with family, number of children", most declined to answer. However, of those that did answer, 33 children were identified. 64% of respondents indicated they were looking for work, a 3% increase over 2009. When asked what could be done to improve their situation, 36% said a job or work opportunities and 17% said having a place to live. The most prevalent source of income for the participants was "odd jobs" at 14%, while 16% of participants indicated that they had "no income". 55% of participants made \$500 or less per month; (there were a large number of "no response", 31%, to this question). 31% said that lack of work or loss of work led to their current circumstance, a 4% increase over 2009 and a 12% increase since 2008. When asked about the most difficult aspect of being homeless, 22% said loneliness/depression/or uncertain future and 17% said staying warm and dry. 28% of participants were chronically homeless, a 4% increase over 2009, defined as: Continuously homeless for 1 year or had at least 4 episodes of homelessness in the past 3 years, disabled, and alone.

Participants were asked if they ever felt discriminated against, and whether they had ever experienced violence while homeless. 61% of participants indicated they had experienced discrimination because they were homeless and 36% had experienced violence while homeless.

JAIL AND PRISON EXPERIENCE:

Participants were asked about their jail and/or prison experience. These were not invasive questions but rather exploratory questions to determine if the participant had ever been in jail and/or prison. 73% of the participants said they had been in jail, a 3% increase from 2009 and a 7% increase from 2008. 32% of participants had been in prison, a 6% increase from 2009

HEALTH AND DISABILITY VARIABLES:

Participants were asked a series of questions related to health and disability. The purpose for asking these questions was to determine how many participants had health problems, disabilities, and how many felt they were at risk for HIV/AIDS and/or Hepatitis C. 59% indicated they had health problems, 63% dental problems, 59% said they had disability concerns, and 16% indicated they felt they were at risk for HIV/AIDS and/or Hepatitis C due to their homeless status. 49% of the participants had seen a doctor within the last year, while only 13% had seen a dentist within the last year. 24% of participants stated they had a substance abuse issue.
