# Public Comment/Feedback Period On The Proposed New Licensing Rules Has Been Extended!

The Early Learning Division's Office of Child Care recently completed a full review and revision of child care licensing rules. The rule process included input from child care providers and other community members. The rules are based on best practices for children's development and national health and safety standards. The licensing rules provide the foundation for high quality early learning environments. Child care rules cover health and safety, record keeping, enrollment and program activities. The rules also address the training and experience required of staff, and rules on applying for and maintaining a license.

### Child Care Safety Portal

### https://childcaresafetyportal.ode.state.or.us/portal/

The web portal is a resource for Oregon residents to get information about the safety, health, and quality of licensed childcare facilities. Searchable content includes facility status, a summary of the state's inspections of the facility, complaint information, enforcement activity, and details about injuries and deaths that have occurred at the facility.

Every regulated facility receives at least one announced inspection and one unannounced inspection every year. The portal displays inspections completed in the past 3 years and facility status for the past 10 years. Only valid complaint allegations and observed non-compliance are displayed.

**Valid:** A complaint or violation is found valid when there is evidence that the violation occurred. The information displayed online only includes complaints that were found valid and violations that were observed as part of the on-site complaint assessment.

**Valid & Corrected:** The rule(s) that were violated will be listed online, and it will be noted whether the violation was corrected during the on-site complaint assessment.

**Serious Injuries:** Includes injuries that occurred at licensed child care facilities where attention from a licensed health professional, such as a physician, EMT, or nurse was sought. Facilities are required to report these injuries to the Office of Child Care within seven days of the occurrence. The Child Care Safety Portal shows only total number of injuries at a facility.

**Spark Rating**: Spark (formally QRIS) is a star rating system that programs can choose to participate in. They get a star rating from SPARK by meeting standards that are good for children.

The information in the Child Care Safety Portal is updated every Tuesday morning by 8am.

Oregon QRIS Resources<sup>TM</sup> is an easy-to-use, web-based platform offering a wealth of tools, programs and services to help early childhood education centers and home-based providers manage their programs more efficiently and effectively. It is a support offered to programs who achieve a Commitment to Quality designation to assist them as they work to improve their programs. The site has resources that are best practices for early childhood programs across the country and can be a great starting point for programs to document their policies and procedures for the QRIS portfolio. However, they may not completely meet all of the requirements of Oregon's QRIS. Each program is responsible for reading and understanding the portfolio requirements and making any changes to the resources used to insure that they meet the QRIS standards and reflect their actual practices.

### **SAVING TIME**

Remember, not everything on the site, while best practices and useful, may fully meet the standards for QRIS. Programs may need to make changes to any resources used in order to meet the QRIS standards. Programs must also only submit documentation that reflect their actual practices.

### **Exploring the Standards**

In this edition, we will be examining the Domain of Administration and Business Practices (AB) Standard 5.

### Standard AB5

A comprehensive program evaluation process is developed and performed on an annual basis. The evaluation examines the program's policies and procedures, care and education environment, curriculum and administration and business practices. Evaluation sources may include:

- · Family survey/family input
- · Program personnel feedback/input (or provider self-evaluation)
- · Rating scales or evaluation instruments (for example ECERS/FCCERS-R, Preschool Program Quality Assesment)
- · Child outcome data from assessments
- · Outside evaluators

Standard AB5 asks programs to develop a comprehensive system with which to evaluate program

**practices.** To accomplish this goal, it is very useful to include a variety of sources in the evaluation **process.** Spark includes five methods that can be used effectively for this purpose. Often this standard is not passed as a result of confusion about what does or doesn't qualify for the items listed. Below, each method is described in order to assist you in achieving your desired star level for this standard.

Family Survey/Family Input – The Spark Family Survey parents complete as part of the spark process meets this criteria.

**Program personnel feedback/input or provider self evaluation** – Do you have a system in place to gather feedback from your staff to evaluate some or all aspects of the program? This could be either a formal written evaluation tool or feedback gathered in a more informal manner. You may document the process for gathering staff input as part of your written description. If you use an evaluation tool of some kind, feel free to include it. Please note, that what is being asked for here is the process by which staff can contribute to an evaluation of the program, not the process by which you evaluate staff performance.

Rating Scales or Evaluation Instruments – The Quality Improvement Plan you completed at the beginning of the Spark process would be one tool you might use. In your written description you might indicate some specific information gleaned from the process and the changes that are being made as a result. Other tools you might use can be found at <a href="http://www.naeyc.org/">http://www.naeyc.org/</a> Any tool that evaluates some aspect of your program can be used here. For example, a USDA certifier would use their tool to evaluate your nutrition practices.

**Child outcome data from assessments** – If you conduct assessments on children and use the information in on-going program evaluation and modification, you can include that information here. For example, your data from assessments might indicate that a number of children are working on large motor skills. Making some modifications to your outside area as a result would meet this criteria. As always, include a detailed description in your portfolio.

**Outside Evaluators** – A number of people might fulfill this role. A Quality Improvement Specialist, staff from your local Resource and Referral agency, a professional peer, or a USDA monitor would all be appropriate choices to serve as an outside evaluator. You can describe the process of who the evaluator was and what specifically was evaluated in the written description. The evaluator does not need to use a formal evaluation tool. However, if a tool is used, that would meet two criteria for this standard. (Outside evaluator and evaluation tool.) Please note that your Licensing Specialist does not meet the criteria as that evaluation is required of all programs.

Every summer, public libraries across the country provide an incentive-based program to encourage kids and teens to read throughout the summer, thus helping to prevent the "summer slide." In addition, the Salem Public Library offers a listening club for pre-readers and their parents to encourage the continued development of early literacy skills that babies, toddlers, and preschoolers need in order to become readers. Reading is the most important skill needed for all other lifelong learning.

### How the summer reading club works.

- 1. Sign up online for the 2018 Youth Summer Reading Club or the 2018 Adult Summer Reading Club or at the main branch at any Ask Here Desk through July 29.
- 2. Keep track of the time you spend reading or listening to stories on the reading log.
- 3. When you have logged at least 10 hours of reading/listening to stories, visit the Summer Reading Club desk beginning June 28 to claim prizes and tickets for chances to win extra special prizes in the summer prize drawings.

### What kinds of prizes?



### **Suggested Lead Process Timeline & Checklist**

### **JULY**

- Read the lead documents you received from the ELD and/or OCC.
- Keep a pen and paper handy and jot down any questions you think of as your read to make a Question Sheet.
- Go through your home/child care space with masking/duct tape and a sharpie marker; create a label above each water source in your space. Give each water source a number, name and indicate whether it is used for drinking/food prep or not. Like this:

#1-Main Kitchen-Used for drinking/food prep.

### #2-Hall Bathroom-Not Used for drinking/food

 As you create your labels, create a corresponding Master/Key to the water sources in your space. Use a highlighter to indicate those used for drinking/food prep, like this:

### Water Source Key (July/2018)

### #1-Main Kitchen-Used for Drinking/Food Prep

#2-Hall Bathroom- No drinking/ food prep #3-Laundry sink-No drinking/food prep.

 Post your Master/Key somewhere visible; like next to your license or emergency exit plan.

### **AUGUST**

- Contact your licensing specialist and/or the Lead Line and ask each of the questions on your Question Sheet.
   If you need help making these calls, your CCR&R can assist you.
- Begin testing: the highlighted water sources on your Master/Key are the ones to test for lead. Choose a lab from the accredited drinking water lab. List sent out by the ELD/OCC.

Office of Child Care Lead Hotline 503-947-5908

 Follow the lab's/OCC's directions for collecting and sending your sample/s in for testing. Only your water sources identified as drinking/food prep must be tested.

### **When You Receive Results**

- When you receive your test results from the lab, post them on your Master/Key Sheet and send a copy of the results to the Office of Child Care. You can mail or email them to: <a href="mailto:ELD.lead@state.or.us"><u>ELD.lead@state.or.us</u></a> or Office of Child Care; 700 Summer Street NE; Salem, OR; 97301. This must be done by 09/30/2018.
- If your test results are at or above 15 parts per billion for lead you must:
- ⇒ Immediately stop using the water from that source for drinking or prep cooking. Change the water source label and Master/Key to read "no drinking/food prep" Use bottle water or packaged water instead. Water at 15 parts per billion or above can still be used for household use like washing clothes and dishes.
- ⇒ Create a Corrective Plan and submit it to the OCC within 60 days. Your licensing specialist can help you do this.
- Notify your families of test results. You can create a handout email for your families. Include your Corrective Plan if applicable.
- If your water is below the 15 parts per billion, then you
  may continue to use your water sources as before.
  Keep your labels and Master/Key sheet intact
  and on display.

The process must be repeated every six years.

### **FINALLY**

If you are a DHS-listed provider serving DHS families, you can be reimbursed for the cost of the lead testing process. This reimbursement is paid to you as a stipend that is processed through CCCCR&R at TRI/WOU. You must fill out two different short forms and submit them to your CCR&R with a receipt from the lab you used for testing. Directions for reimbursement should be arriving soon from DHS/TRI and your CCR&R support specialists will follow up with support as the **September 30, 2018** deadline approaches.




### PORTABLE KIDS' WATER WALLS

Supplies we used:

- Garden gates
- Zip ties and/or wires
- Buckets
- Hoses
- Rain gutters
- Pinwheels
- Plastic ducts

### How to Make Erupting Ice Chalk

### **Supplies:**

Cornstarch

Baking Soda

Water

Liquid Watercolor paint or food coloring

Ice cube trays

Vinegar

Squeezy Bottles

### **DIRECTIONS:**

The measurements do not have to be exact, but for the sake of ease I used a 1/4 cup measuring cup to scoop out the baking soda and cornstarch. I used 1/4 cup of each, squirted some liquid watercolor paint on the mixture, then topped it off with 1/2 cup of water. Mix well with a spoon then pour the erupting paint mixture into an ice cube tray and stick the trays in the freezer until there is time to paint.

Hose off patio or sidewalk and set the erupting ice chalk in bowls and invited children to paint. Wetting the cement isn't necessary, but it helps the ice chalk melt and spread faster. It also showcases the gorgeous blending colors more easily.

The beauty of ice chalk on a hot day is that even without intentionally painting, the colors melt and mark the ground beautifully.

Once the ice chalk has sufficiently melted and mixed, it's time to bring out the squeezy bottles of vinegar. If you don't have squeezy bottles you can use spray bottles, cups, bowls, or really any container. Squeezy bottles are just so dang fun, and they have the added benefit of boosting fine motors skills.

While painting encourage kids to keep their artwork to one central location on the patio, to achieve larger eruptions. When done painting simply rinse off the patio or sidewalk with hose, easy peasy.

### How to Make a Puppy Puppet

### What You'll Need

2 toilet paper tubes, paint, paintbrush, hole punch, bendy plastic straws, yarn, 2 popsicle sticks, office dot stickers, 2 googly eyes, glue, scissors

### Make It

- 1. Paint the toilet paper tubes; let dry. Cut one tube in half; one half will be for the head, the other for the ears.
- 2. Cut the ears -- a single elongated 8-shape out of the cardboard tube -- and glue them to the top of one side of the head. Push in the cardboard where the ears are glued, creating an indent on the head to make the ears stick up.
- 3. Glue two Popsicle sticks together to form a cross; set aside.
- 4. Punch four holes on the bottom of the body for the legs. Thread two 6" pieces of yarn through the leg holes, adding cut bendy straw pieces for the feet. Knot at each end.
- 5. On the opposite side of the tube, punch holes at both ends of the body; thread a long piece of yarn (approximately 24") through the body and head. Tie it to the Popsicle stick-cross.
- 6. Glue on a cut bendy straw to create a tail and stick on office dot stickers and googly eyes.
