You Can Claim Valuable Tax Credits - Worth More Than Ever This Year!

You've been working hard – get the tax credits you deserve. More families than ever are eligible for child care tax credits this year. To get these credits, you must file a tax return.

This year many workers will qualify for the Earned Income Credit (EIC) for the first time because their income declined or they became unemployed; tax refunds through the EIC and Child Tax Credit can help low and moderate income families cover day-to-day expenses such as utilities, rent and child care. Families with three or more children also get an extra boost with a larger EIC this year.

When you file your taxes for 2010, you may be eligible for federal and state tax credits worth thousands of dollars, including:

- **Earned Income Tax Credit**, which helps provide a wage supplement for low and moderate-income families (those earning less than \$48,362 annually). This credit is worth up to **\$5,666**, and is refundable.
- **Child Tax Credit**, designed to help families offset some of the costs of raising children. This credit is worth up to \$1,000 per child. Families who owe little or no income tax can receive some or all of this credit as a refund if they earned at least \$3,000 in 2010.
- Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit, designed to offset some of the child or dependent care costs that families incur in order to work. This credit is worth up to \$2,100, though the amount that can be claimed is limited by a family's actual federal income tax liability.
- **Making Work Pay Credit**, designed to increase families' take-home pay. This refundable credit is worth up to \$800 for couples. Many workers received their Making Work Pay Credit as an increase in their take-home pay.

In addition, Oregon also offers:

- Oregon Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit, worth up to \$1,800;
- Oregon Working Family Child Care Tax Credit, a refundable credit worth up to 40% of qualifying child care expenses; and
- Oregon Earned Income Tax Credit, also refundable and worth up to \$340.

Even if you don't owe income taxes, you may be eligible for a refund check simply by claiming these credits on your federal and Oregon tax returns!

Each tax filing season, the Oregon Child Care Resource & Referral Network and the National Women's Law Center conduct a tax credit outreach campaign to help inform working families in Oregon about these credits and about free tax preparation services in their communities.
